Since the college does not develop any curriculum but simply follows/implements the one framed by the university, the question of adapting quality improvement strategies for curriculum development does not arise.

**6.3.2 Teaching and Learning**

Although the syllabi are not framed by the college but by the university to which it is affiliated to, each department adapts some innovative processes in teaching and learning. First of all, at the beginning of each academic session the faculties of each department meet for term-wise allocation of syllabus assignments, contents, fix dates for the term-end tests and prepare the academic calendar of that session. Secondly, the department organizes students' seminars, quiz contests etc.. They subscribe to e-journals. Multiple choice questions are also

set in the term-tests to encourage the students to read the text books thoroughly which will help them get good results in the exams.

The college serves as centre for the university examinations each year, the college also conducts class tests and term tests to evaluate the academic progress of the students. 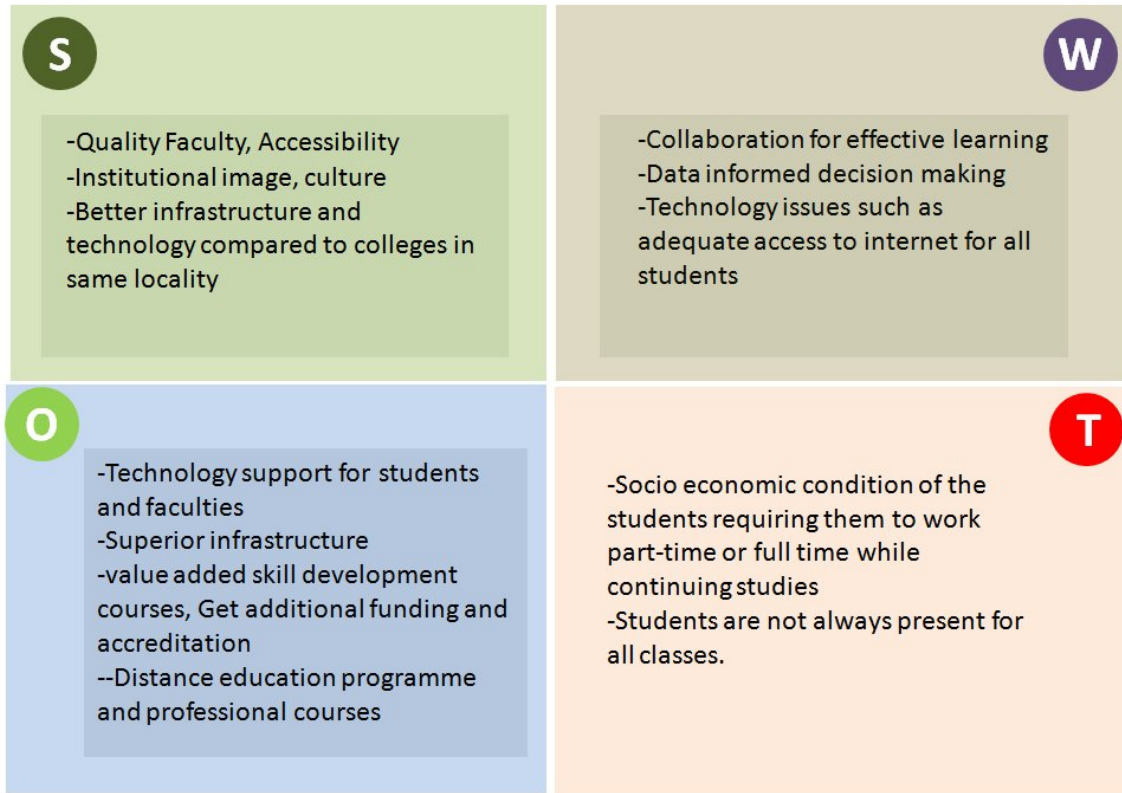
